

ALONG

to tell sb to go away

"Run along now, children! I'm busy."

DOWN

to decline in number or size,
lose power, find sb

"The battery has run down; it needs to be recharged."

ON

to continue without interruption, to think or talk about sth

"The discussion ran on for hours;"

AFTER

to chase, try to have a romantic relationship

"Why do dogs run after cats?"

ACROSS

to meet or to find unexpectedly, cross by running

"I ran across some old friends at the party."

AWAY

to leave a place or sb, escape

"The prisoners ran away from prison."

INTO

to experience sth unexpectedly, meet by chance, crash into, reach a large figure

"I ran into your boss at the restaurant"

OVER

to look at quickly, overflow, to knock over

"We'll just run over the main points again."

AROUND

to be very busy doing lots of things

"The child ran around all day in the garden."

AGAINST

to oppose towards sb or sth, to experience a difficulty

"Luck was really running against you yesterday!"
